Behavioral Health Expansion

New outpatient program, patient navigation services bridge gap

In follow-up to a \$3.5 million grant awarded by the Massachusetts Health Policy Commission (HPC) in 2014, Harrington has begun implementation of several programs aimed to expand access to critical behavioral health services throughout Southern Worcester County.

The "medical home model" places licensed behavioral health clinicians and patient navigators within Harrington's inpatient unit and Emergency Care Center in Southbridge and the

Harrington Physician Services (HPS) family practice office in Charlton.

In November, Harrington will open the region's first-ever, intensive outpatient program for substance abuse in Southbridge. Prior to this program opening, Worcester was the only option for patients who required

a higher level of care because of significant risk factors and to prevent further relapse and hospitalization in this region.

Greg Mirhej, Assistant Vice President for Harrington's Behavioral Health Services, said one of the primary program goals is to reduce Harrington's 30-day Southbridge Emergency Room re-visits by 15 percent over the next two years.

A navigator and clinician will be added to the HPS Webster primary care office by December.

A portion of the HPC grant was also awarded to help fund a new, inpatient psychiatric unit at Harrington's Webster Campus. The 16-bed 8,200-square-foot unit will be the first in centra and western Massachusetts to offer an inpatient unit with a specialty track for patients suffering from both mental illness and substance abuse. The facility is scheduled to be opened in late 2016.

Harrington Lauded for Having Lowest C-Section Rate in State

In the latest Leapfrog "report card," Harrington has received what amounts to an A+ for having the lowest C-section rate in Massachusetts--14.3%. The Leapfrog Group, the leading independent national advocate for hospital quality, safety, and affordability, recognized Harrington HealthCare System for this achievement after having also recognizing us as one of the nation's "Top Hospitals" the last two years.

Harrington was the only hospital in the area to be in the top three in the ratings, besting major medical centers in Worcester and Boston. The state's average C-section rate is 26.2%.

The Leapfrog data only included C-sections for first-time, low-risk deliveries.

"We carefully manage each patient to ensure that babies are delivered in the safest and least complicated manner," said Mark Simonelli, MD, Harrington Chief of Ob/Gyn. "Leapfrog's report is a great validation of what for us is business as usual."

"We may be a relatively small community hospital, but it's very gratifying when we're recognized as the best in the region for different aspects of care," said Ed Moore, Harrington president and CEO. "Quality and safety always come first."



New Protocol for Hemorrhage Patients

We have adopted a new protocol to provide a standardized approach to improve outcomes for patients suffering from massive hemorrhage. Using a multidisciplinary team, we will ensure the rapid availability of blood, blood products, and qualified personnel to assist the hemorrhaging patient. The goal is to restore blood volume and composition rapidly to maintain hemostasis.

Utilizing the code "TRANSFUSION TEAM" and including the unit where the crisis is occurring with our overhead (*66) paging system will mobilize team members in a coordinated response to improve outcomes for these patients. The medical leader will order needed products, nursing leadership will notify Blood Bank, phlebotomy will arrive to draw needed labs, and the nursing responders will assist with management of the patient--recording the events, running for blood product, assisting the team leader, and safeguarding valuable blood bank resources to stabilize the patient. Employees can expect drills to start soon on campus, as well as a new policy to be finalized and signed.
